Instructional Strategies to Facilitate Learning Faculty Development Course

Franklin University offers faculty and staff from Community College Alliance schools the opportunity to complete our *Instructional Strategies to Facilitate Learning* faculty development course.

This course focuses on using instructional technologies effectively, while recognizing and incorporating learning and instructional strategies in learning communities. *Instructional Strategies to Facilitate Learning* enhances the student's ability to manage a team environment, to resolve issues with difficult students, and to give constructive feedback through grading. Students will also learn how to manage time for efficient delivery of a course.

This virtual, non-credit, master's level course is delivered in a six-week format. There is no tuition cost for faculty and staff from Community College Alliance schools but a textbook is required for purchase. Students will need to commit an estimated 8-12 hours per week plus an additional 2-4 hours for synchronous activities.
